Principal's Message



The 2014 year is rapidly drawing to an end. It has been a year full of challenges and opportunities for our staff, students and parents. The school has been busy planning for the introduction of Year 7's into high school for the first time in 2015, preparing and presenting for the Independent Public School review and planning for the first time under a new funding model. I was very pleased with the feedback supplied by the Department of Educational Services after their review, especially with their finding which stated:

"The school can be justified in claiming it is achieving its purpose to ensure that the academic, creative, social and personal potential of each student develops to the highest possible level."

The school will grow significantly in 2015 with our school population increasing to above 850 students. We will also have over 10 new staff members who have been specifically chosen by the school through a number of selection panels. The increase in student numbers is a bonus for all students across the school as it will enable MRSHS to offer an increase in subject offerings. This will be particularly pertinent in the future with upper school offerings.

We just completed the Year 6 to 7 and 7 to 8 Orientation Days for students coming to Margaret River Senior High School in 2015. These were exciting days for the school as our future students get to experience high school life and we very pleased to see so many parents attend.

I would like to remind parents that the school uniform is compulsory. Parents can access information in relation to the school uniform from either the front administration office or via our website: www.margaretrivershs.wa.edu.au

We have two tours that are planned to run this term. Currently we have more than 50 students attending the Sydney/Canberra tour, where students have the opportunity to experience the Sydney Opera House, the Powerhouse Museum, the War Memorial and Parliament House to name a few. Later in December we will hold our inaugural Japan Tour where 20 excited students will visit and experience life in Japan. We hope that these will be two tours that will provide students with lifelong memories.

As this is the last Newsletter for this year, I would like to thank students, parents and staff for their work in 2014. This has been a very successful year for Margaret River Senior High School.

I wish all in the community a very Merry Christmas and a safe and rewarding 2015. Students return to school on Monday 2nd February 2015.

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Languages News

MRSHS (and particularly the S&E/Language Faculty) continues to punch above our weight with the announcement on the eve of Remembrance Day that **Year 10 student India Stanley has won a place on the 2015 12 day Premier's ANZAC Tour to Turkey** next year for the 100 year commemorations.

This is an amazing opportunity for India and an incredible achievement for herself, the school and the wider community. India is the fifth Margaret River SHS student or staff member to have won a position on one of the now eleven ANZAC Tours.

After writing an essay on the links of the ANZAC legend to Western Australia and West Australians today she was initially placed into the finals with 57 other students. She was selected from over 1000 Year 8 to 11 students from both public and private schools from across WA. During the October school holidays she participated in a panel interview and other activities in the process to select the final 32 students.

She will be part of a much larger than usual ANZAC Tour group of 32 students and five teachers from across Western Australia.

The Premier's ANZAC Student Tour will travel to Turkey from Thursday, 16 April to Monday, 27 April 2015. Travel in 2015 coincides with Anzac Day, with the group undertaking a study tour of the Gallipoli Peninsula and Istanbul, prior to attending commemorative services on 25 April marking the 100th anniversary of the ANZAC landings at Gallipoli.

While the education program for the 2015 tour will cover Australia's broad involvement in the region during World War I, special attention will be paid to the part played by West Australians. India and the other 31 selected students will serve as youth ambassadors for Western Australia and commit to sharing their tour experiences at their respective schools and with organisations within their wider communities.

The class was visited by Lynne Tognolini – the Uthando coordinator from Perth. She explained the importance of what the students were doing and gave the class some background information as to how the project was started. Last year 2600 dolls from Western Australia were sent to South Africa but as she explained many more are needed to help meet the needs of the orphanages and kindergartens in KwaZulu-Natal.

At this stage students are making clothes for their dolls and finishing off their hairstyles. As their dolls have progressed, students can see a "personality" developing and many have felt quite connected to the doll they have created.

Career Cruises

Our Year 10 students were given the opportunity to be involved in Career Cruises which explored opportunity and training in industries that they might not have been exposed to in Margaret River.

On 4th November a group of enthusiastic student boarded the bus at 6.15am to head to Fremantle to visit the marine industry. We first toured Austral Ships and viewed the production line where four large customs ships were being built and the students could see the over 33 occupations involved in the process. After having a relaxed lunch on Fisherman's Wharf, we then walked to Challenger Institute of Technology where we were given a tour of the aquaculture industry and the various career pathways and training available. The students loved viewing the breeding tanks and seeing each stage in the production process. The end of the tour was the students experimenting with a bridge simulation activity where they could drive cargo ships and speed boats.

Our second tour was on 13th November which involved an exploration of the Creative Industries at Central Institute of Technology in East Perth, Northbridge and Leederville. We were met by the Career Counsellor at Central and shown around the Visual Art, Fashion and Design, Graphic Design, Animation and Game Design, Radio, Film and Television and Music Departments. We walked through classes of students in training and spoke to several lecturers delivering their courses. The day finished with a concert from the Certificate IV Music students in Leederville where they were being filmed and assessed and competing for a place in an upcoming music

festival. The day finished with a tour of SAE (Creative Media Institute) which is a private college that delivers courses in multi-media, film and sound, game design, animation and interactive technologies. It was great to see the flexibility available in course delivery and how a small campus delivers Certificate, Diploma and Bachelor courses.

The students can be commended on their excellent behaviour on both excursions.

Year 10 Childcare

Through Margaret River Senior High School's Enrichment and Engagement program, funding was granted to purchase three Real Care Babies for use in the Year 10 Childcare program. We have had the babies in our school for a month now with three girls each taking a baby home to care for over the weekend. These virtual babies require similar care to a real baby with the "mother" required to work out why the babies are crying and what they have to do to make it stop. This could involve changing the baby's clothes if it is too hot/too cold, changing the baby's nappy, feeding, burping, rocking or simply just comforting. At the end of the weekend the students receive a summary report that identifies how well they met their baby's needs.

The feedback from the students so far is that it has been a very positive and worthwhile experience, giving them a real insight into what it is like to care for a newborn child. Most students have struggled with a lack of sleep – being woken several times during the night.

Three students – Sophie Newstead, Ruby Kawati and Aimee Jennion decided to look after their three children together and organised a sleep-over. They quickly discovered that each of their children had different needs at different times, meaning that all three of them received very little sleep.

The Childcare program is designed to introduce students to the needs of young children and how, as a parent or caregiver, you can meet these needs. This unit is a foundation for future studies in the childcare or education industry as well as providing valuable parenting skills.


